- developing a personalised learning and support plan
- discussing the plan with teachers and providing support to implement the learning plan
- providing advice to the principal regarding the additional educational needs of the student and what may be required to meet these needs
- reviewing and evaluating the student's program once per term.

# Hi everyone!

We are lucky here at TWPS to be a very multicultural school. It is important to be respectful of each other's cultures and to acknowledge cultural challenges that some of students face.

# Did you know that Australia is one of the world's most culturally diverse countries?

In fact, nearly 30% of Australia's population was born overseas and the number of languages spoken at home by Australians is over 400!

Schools in Australia therefore have contact with students and families from many different cultural backgrounds. We all learn to communicate and understand our world through sharing language, customs, behaviours, beliefs and values.

#### What is cultural diversity?

Cultural diversity refers to people who identify with particular groups based on their birthplace, ethnicity, language, values, beliefs or world views. This does not mean that everyone from a particular cultural group will hold exactly the same values or do things in the same way. Showing support for cultural diversity involves talking with people to find out how best to include them and respect their cultural needs.

# What are some of the challenges that students from different cultural backgrounds may experience?

Resettling in a new country can be complicated. Families need to find housing, employment, schools, social connections and services. Lack of knowledge about how things work in the new environment and communication difficulties can make the challenge of resettlement all the more stressful.

Family, friends and others who would normally provide support may have been left behind in the move. Feelings of loneliness or concern for those left behind can occur. These difficulties affect all members of a family.

Language can be a major barrier for newly-arrived families. Difficulties communicating in English can cause challenges for families and undermine people's confidence. This may make finding a job or learning at school more difficult and contribute to feeling of loneliness.

#### "I TRUST YOU"

What a <u>humbling</u> experience I had this week when a student asked to talk to me about something important that was happening in this student's life. As we finished this student said, "I like talking to you because I trust you".



TRUSTWORTHINESS is a

character trait that I value in relationships. It is something that I endeavoured to instil in my own children from an early age.

When I am working with students I explain to them that I can only help them if they are truthful with me.

Have you ever had your trust in someone destroyed or has someone lost their trust in you because of a mistake?

It hurts and takes a long time to heal.

TRUST TAKES A LONG TIME TO DEVELOP, BUT CAN BE DESTROYED QUICKLY.

Young children whose needs are met learn what trustworthiness is. They learn to feel secure; they are willing to explore and discover. Without trust, fear develops, and fear breeds lies. Youngsters sometimes test the difference between reality and fantasy. Adults should tell the truth and expect children to tell the truth in return. We want little ones to trust

Trustworthiness means:

- Being reliable; do what you say you'll do
- Having the courage to do the right thing
- Being loyal; stand by your friends
- Being honest

Not deceiving, cheating or stealing

#### Infants, Toddlers and Pre-schoolers

Teaching your child to be trustworthy doesn't happen overnight. Instead, it is something you should model every day. How do you do that? Infants have the capacity to learn from others. The first years of life are trust-building years. Every time you respond quickly and appropriately to your infant's cries, coos and smiles you are building trust.

Patience and persistence will help your toddler develop trustworthiness. Your pre-schooler can learn about telling the truth, respecting property of others and following through. When you pay attention to and model these behaviours every day, your child will develop into a trustworthy individual.

#### School-age, Middle School and Teens

Trust is an especially big deal to a teenager. Teen relationships are vulnerable to real and perceived betrayals of trust. Help your teen understand that trust has two sides. One is to trust, to have faith and confidence in the intentions and actions of others — to believe that he will do the right thing. The other is to be trustworthy — to demonstrate by words and acts that people can trust him

Your child should understand that trustworthiness is essential to meaningful relationships, long-lasting friendships, and successful associations in school and in the workplace. Talk to your child about the four major qualities of trustworthiness and discuss situations that you both face that challenge each of these qualities.

Integrity - being true to yourself and living up
 to your highest and best personal values

**Honesty** – telling the truth and doing what is right even if no one else is doing it

**Promise-keeping** – keeping your word and being dependable

**Loyalty** – standing by, sticking up for and protecting family, friends and country; being a good friend and looking out for those who

care about you
